Dear Friends,

One of the most powerful messages a survivor of sexual and domestic violence can receive is that of hope--that a peaceful existence is deserved and attainable. Healing begins through our connections with each other. These connections create a foundation of peace and safety for thousands of survivors in the New River Valley.

For 48 years, the Women's Resource Center of the New River Valley, Inc. has provided free, comprehensive programs and services to adults and children who have experienced sexual and domestic violence. Our outreach and prevention efforts are a model across the state and a cornerstone for public and survivor awareness throughout the New River Valley. These collective services, offered for almost half a century, are crucial to healing and connection for survivors in our community.

This year brought both challenges and transformation to our organization. We prioritized our prevention and outreach presence in the community and provided emergency shelter that often operated at capacity. We expanded rapid re-housing services and responded to an increased demand for in-person hospital accompaniment and legal advocacy services. We experienced internal challenges with transitioning staff and leadership roles; many of these vacancies were filled by internal candidates demonstrating our commitment to meaningful career pathways for our staff. We welcomed two exceptional board members who have worked in the field for over thirty years each. The board's depth of nonprofit leadership and breadth of lived experience are invaluable. We continue to thrive with staff and board members who are passionate and dedicated to supporting survivors.

The events of 2025 underscore the urgent need for our collective efforts to implement individual and social change for a violence free community in the New River Valley. The continued reality of cuts in funding and of challenges to laws that protect the wellbeing of survivors threatens our mission. At the Women's Resource Center of the New River Valley, Inc. we show up every day to help prevent violence, support survivors, instill hope, and press for change. As we continue the work of 2025, our mission is more critical than ever: to build a community free of sexual and domestic violence. Together we can achieve it.






"The Women's Resource Center operates a residential group counseling program for children participating in our transitional housing opportunity. This group counseling program looks different throughout the year, most notably in the summer. This program benefits from schools being closed for the summer, allowing more opportunities to provide to residents, such as field trips and alternative hours. The Cornerstone program offers a wide variety of activities, anywhere from exploring unique local experiences to offering activities at our physical location.

In June of this year, our children's program was able to try a new experience at the Virginia Techniques Gymnastics Center in Christiansburg. This gymnasium offers an open gym named "PlayZone" which provides a wide variety of toys, and gymnastic equipment for children walking age to 10 years old. For our first trip, two children under the age of 5 were able to join us with their parent. I was unsure how accessible the PlayZone would be for very young children, but I was pleasantly surprised with how much was available for all ages.

The family that joined us shared that they enjoyed the trip so much that they wanted to go on every PlayZone trip that was planned in the future. This feedback encouraged me to plan more PlayZone trips in future calendars, which resulted in even more residents attending and enjoying Virginia Techniques. One of our residents enjoyed their trip so much that they asked about possibly joining the gymnastics program that Virginia Technique offers. The most popular offerings at the PlayZone seemed to be the large ball pit and a runway that led to a foam block pit. All in all, our multiple trips to the PlayZone were successful and encouraged everyone who attended to come again. The Cornerstone program will make sure to include the PlayZone in future offerings for residential groups." - Dylan Lohr, Children's Counselor
